55 Laser Projectors Installed	Upgraded Classroom Technology Outdated and failing projection systems in 55 classrooms were replaced with laser projectors. Benefits for teaching and learning include: • Improved image clarity and brightness • More displayed screen real estate • Quieter operation • Remote monitoring and support options • Fewer service and maintenance outages Unlike conventional bulb-based projection systems requiring frequent service, laser projectors require little to no service and are expected to last at least five to six years before significant service or replacement is required. Upgraded display capabilities offer a better experience for students, while reliable operation insures classrooms are available for more hours to support teaching and learning.	69,636 students per year are enrolled in classes held in 55 upgraded rooms.

3 Classrooms Renovated, 22 Classrooms Repaired	Upgraded Classroom Technology ITS is partnering with Facilities for a complete renovation of three classrooms (10-124, 10-125, and 10-126) and minor repairs in 22 other classrooms. ITS will be installing all new innovative technology in three classrooms to model future classrooms after. New features include: • Dual short-throw laser projector display systems offering double the standard screen real estate • Projectable, touch-sensitive whiteboards • Mobile and height-adjustable instructor's station with installed computer and touch control systems • Wireless connection to display systems • Remote monitoring and control systems	3,866 students per year are enrolled in classes held in the three renovated rooms. About 27,000 students are enrolled annually in the 22 classrooms being repaired.
